Dear beloved in Christ,

Grace and peace to you from our risen Savior, Jesus Christ. This month of February marks our beginning of Lent in the Lutheran church. Ash Wednesday is February 17th. What does Ash Wednesday and Lent mean to you? How have you observed Lent in the past?

Lent is the forty-day journey toward Easter, which begins on Ash Wednesday. This is a day of repentance and worship when our foreheads are marked with the sign of the cross using ashes or dust or dirt. As this is done, we hear “Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return”. We acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the cross also reminds us of the cross marked on our foreheads at baptism. As we acknowledge our mortality, we acknowledge our need for salvation through Jesus Christ and the promise of salvation already given to each of us.

Ash Wednesday and Lent is a time of repentance or turning to God. This invites us to consider what in our life distracts us from God and what can help us turn more intentionally to God. Repentance is a time of honest confession to God and a time to ask for forgiveness. Repentance need not be frightening or intimidating. Rather, it can be a liberating homecoming to a God who already knows you and loves you. This is an invitation to grow deeper in faith as we acknowledge our mortality, name our sins and trust God with our brokenness that we often hide and overlook. As we repent, we experience the grace and mercy of God’s forgiveness and acceptance.

While confessing our sins is part of repentance, there are many ways to turn toward God. This could be spending time in prayer or devotions or finding an activity that helps you connect with God. Some choose to fast from certain foods or take on a new spiritual practice. However the time is used, the meaning is gained when we focus our hearts and minds on Christ's relationship with us.

This year it may feel like we don't need Lent. We have had more reminders of our mortality than ever and there is not one of us who hasn't sacrificed greatly because of the pandemic. Perhaps this is an opportunity to experience Lent differently. Instead of focusing on the somberness of Lent, this could be a time to give thanks for God's merciful and gracious love who welcomes us in our brokenness. Repentance could be an opportunity to let go of unnecessary burdens that distract us from Christ's presence in our lives. This year, as we've painfully faced our mortality, we need the hope of Christ's salvation which is promised for you and your loved ones. Death is never the end as we live and die to Christ who lives eternally.

This year, our Lenten theme is "Created for Community." In a year when we've been physically separated from one another, it's never been more important to focus on being in community with one another. During Ash Wednesday, we are also reminded that "we are created for communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation." (LDE ELW, 617). We will remember and practice creatively ways we live in communion with God, with one another, and with creation. We will reflect on this in worship and through an invitation to share God's love with all creation. Thanks be to God who gives us grace upon grace as we can love God, our neighbors, and creation freely.

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## **LENT @ New Era 2021**

### **"Created for Community."**

As stated in the opening letter, our theme this year is created for community as we celebrate the many ways we live in communion with God, with one another, and with creation. This will occur as we worship together and think creatively and expansively on how God calls us to share love and grace with all creation.

#### **Ash Wednesday, February 17th**

This year, we will deliver a Lent at home kit. This will contain devotions for the family and a kit to make your own ashes. We purchased kits from Old Lutheran which contain the dry ashes that you can mix with oil (NOT WATER).

We will share a recording of Ash Wednesday on the church's Facebook page and church website. There will be a time

for you to make the sign of the cross on your forehead during this worship service. You can keep the ashes in the kit during Lent as a reminder of our need for Christ's salvation and the promise of salvation given to you.

You are also invited to a drive-up worship service at Gloria Dei on Ash Wednesday at 5:30 pm. You will park your vehicle facing the entrance of the church and will tune your radio to a certain station. We will gather together to pray, to hear scripture, and be reminded of Christ's eternal love which is made known to us on the cross. You will have an opportunity to receive the imposition of ashes on your forehead. I will wear a mask, face shield, and gloves. The service will be less than 30 minutes.

#### **Mid- week services**

Mid-week services will be shared on the church's Facebook page & church website every Wednesday. They will follow the theme of created for community and offer a time of prayer, scripture, and reflection. Lenten Devotions

This year we are sharing devotions from Augsburg Fortress entitled A Story to tell. These devotionals are in booklet form and provide a brief scripture reading, prayer, and questions for reflection. We are also sharing a children's Lenten booklet, which provides age-appropriate readings, questions, and activities for families to enjoy together. Lastly, we will share weekly & daily ideas on how we can live in communion with God, with one another, and with creation.

These devotions & the ash kit will be delivered to your home. If you would like to volunteer to help deliver, please let Pr. Kirsten know.

### **Farewell to ALLELUIA.**

You may notice that during Lent we refrain from saying or singing "Alleluia". This word, alleluia, is a Hebrew word for praise the Lord. While we continue to praise the Lord throughout Lent, this is one way we observe a fasting during Lent. This a tradition that dates back to the 5th Century. When we worship on Easter morning, we joyously proclaim Alleluia as we celebrate Christ's conquering of death and resurrection.

## The power of love

By comparing love to everything from oxygen and fire to wind and war, songs and poetry emphasize its immense power — for good or for ill.

Christian author Patrick Morley uses metaphors that focus on love's practicality in everyday life: "Love is the glue that holds us together and the oil that keeps us from rubbing each other the wrong way." He also calls love "the WD-40 of relationships" because it "can seep into tight places where logic, threats and even promises just can't seem to penetrate."

St. Augustine, who predated WD-40 by centuries, knew that love not only eases friction in personal interactions but, with God's help, can change hearts and lives.



"Love all [people], even your enemies," he advises. "Love them, not because they are your brothers, but that they may become your brothers. Thus you will ever burn with fraternal love, both for him who is already your brother and for your enemy, that he may by loving become your brother."

## Why we lament

In 2020, the coronavirus pandemic struck America during the middle of Lent, a season associated with deprivation. Some people made light of the shutdowns, joking, "I didn't mean to give up *this* much for Lent!" Others asked why the suffering was occurring in the first place.

Professor N.T. Wright, in an essay for *Time*, explains that asking "why?" but receiving no answer is key to biblical lamenting. Adding to the mystery, he says, is that God also laments — grieving at the wickedness of humans, despairing over Israel's unfaithfulness. Jesus cries at a friend's tomb; the Holy Spirit groans in anguish. "Part of the Christian vocation," Wright concludes, is not being able to explain why but lamenting instead. "As the Spirit laments within us," he says, "so we become, even in our self-isolation, small shrines where the presence and healing love of God can dwell. And out of that there can emerge new possibilities ... new hope."

Catherine Marshall, in *A Closer Walk*, presents a different approach she  
calls fasting from "criticalness." God dealt  
with her judgmental spirit by prompting her  
to spend 24 hours without criticizing  
"anyone about anything." At first, Marshall  
felt rather empty when she didn't engage in  
a heated political debate. But friends and

family didn't seem to miss her comments.  
Plus, God replaced the energy she'd spent  
attempting to correct others with energy  
and creativity to positively influence them.  
A critical spirit can make us lose  
perspective, joy and even relationships. It  
also can prevent the good work God wants  
to achieve through us. Consider what could  
happen as a result of your own "criticalness  
fast." Pray for God to do the correcting  
while you focus on building up others.

## Celebrating love

For 80 years, a couple in Ecuador was an  
exceptional example of marital love. Julio  
Cesar Mora Tapia, 110, and Waldramina  
Maclovía Quinteros Reyes, 104, were wed  
on February 7, 1941. Until Julio's death last  
October, they were reportedly the world's  
oldest married couple. Their large family  
includes nine great-great-grandchildren!  
Good News Network recounts: "Julio Cesar  
fell in love with Waldramina's beauty, her  
conversation, and her big heart."



Meanwhile, she found in him “a poet with a young spirit.” The couple says the formula for a lasting marriage is “love + maturity + mutual respect,” as well as patience, compassion and hard work.

That calls to mind Paul’s words, often read at weddings: “Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth” (1 Corinthians 13:4-6, ESV).

## The gift of desperation

In a 2012 interview with NPR, author Anne Lamott shared: “I’ve heard people say that God is the gift of desperation, and there’s a lot to be said for having really reached a bottom where you’ve run out of anymore good ideas, or plans for everybody else’s behavior; or how to save and fix and rescue; or just get out of a huge mess, possibly of your own creation. And when you’re done, you may take a long, quavering breath and say, ‘Help.’”

Amid the pandemic and life’s other, more typical trials of life, have you found a silver lining — a gift that has arisen out of your desperation? Sometimes we’re more open to God during times of struggle than when all flows smoothly. As long as we think our ideas and plans for ourselves and our loved ones are pretty good, we don’t feel we need a Savior. But when life is so challenging that we call to God for help, “the gift of [that] desperation” is finding that God’s loving arms have embraced and strengthened us all along.

## Always choose love

God wants us to choose to love him freely, even when that choice involves pain, because we are committed to him, not to our own good feelings and rewards. He wants us to cleave to him, as Job did, even when we have every reason to deny him hotly. That, I believe, is the central message of Job.

Satan had taunted God with the accusation that humans are not truly free. Was Job being faithful simply because God had allowed him a prosperous life? Job’s fiery trials proved the answer beyond doubt. Job clung to God’s justice when he was the best example in history of God’s apparent injustice. He did not seek the Giver because of his gifts; when all gifts were removed, he still sought the Giver.
