God is love, strength, wisdom, courage, faithfulness, gentleness, and compassion. God give you this all without end and welcomes you to Christ's table, where there is always a place of honor set for you.

We are praying for you if your children have turned away from you, painfully closing the door on relationship, leaving you holding your broken heart in your hands.

We are praying for you if motherhood is your greatest joy and toughest struggle all rolled into one.

We are praying for you if you are watching your child battle substance abuse, a public legal situation, mental illness, or another situation which you can merely watch unfold.

We are praying for you if you, like so many women before you, do not wish to be a mother, are not married, or in so many other ways do not fit into societal norms.

We are praying for you if you see yourself reflected in all, or none of these stories.

This Mother's Day, wherever and whoever you are, we walk with you. You are loved. You are seen. You are worthy. And may you know the deep love without end of our big, wild, beautiful God who is the very best example of a parent that we know. Amen."

# Dogs' best friend


A 71-year-old graduate in Turkey has become an inspiration to many. Fevzi Uyar had retired after teaching biology for 42 years but decided to pursue another degree. Known as the "grandfather" of homeless animals, he routinely traveled 90 miles every two days to feed stray dogs, who came to recognize his van. Uyar also built dozens of plywood shelters, complete with rugs and blankets, for the dogs. But Uyar often encountered dogs needing medical care and racked up debts with a local veterinarian, so he enrolled in classes himself. The recent graduate now vaccinates and treats the animals he loves so much.



# **Christian symbol**


THREE INTERWOVEN
CIRCLES—Each circle in
this symbol represents one of

the Persons of the Holy Trinity — the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The circles, having no beginning and no end, signify the Trinity's eternal nature. The circles' interlacing symbolizes unity. In the center is a triangle, an ancient symbol of the Trinity.





Answer: power



Jesus commands us to be his witnesses. This craft is a reminder to reach out to all our "circles."

#### What you need:

- 5 bowls or cups (assorted sizes)
- Construction paper
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Brad fastener
- Crayons or markers

#### What you do:

- Place the bowls and cups upside down, each on a different color of paper. Trace around the circles and cut them out.
- With a pencil, pierce a small hole atop each circle. Layer circles on each other from largest to smallest, aligning the holes. Insert the brad through all layers.
- Starting in the center, label the circles my house, my city, my state, my country, the world. Draw a picture on each one.
- Pray, asking Jesus how you can spread his message.
