

Dear beloved in Christ,

Welcome to Advent. As the world around us picks up the pace of going through each day, God beckons us to breathe and be still. As we rush from Thanksgiving to Christmas as if in a race to see who will reach the end of the preparations first, God beckons us to wait. To watch. To wonder. In those small moments, the Holy Spirit whispers God's promise to you *I am bringing love to you in a new way*.

As we resume much of our pre-COVID routines, it is really challenging to be still and sit in God's promise to you. Perhaps you feel an inkling of guilt at sitting still and reading a devotion when there's So. Much. To. Do. If you do, you're not alone. Perhaps you would rather open your favorite book or watch a favorite show at the end of the day. If you do, you're not alone.

And still, the Holy Spirit persists in drawing you closer to God's heart, to show you even as God promises to come in the flesh of Jesus Christ, God is already with you because of Christ's resurrection. The Holy Spirit persists in nudging you to put down the TV remote or your favorite novel and ponder where God can be seen and heard in your day. Where have you felt God's love for you? Where do you need to see God's love and hope in your day today?

As we anticipate the birth of our Savior, we cling to the promise of Christ already in our life. This is a mysterious promise and a powerful promise. God's love for you is faithful and attentive. God knows you need signs of God's gracious hope in your life so God never stops showing you glimpses of love and hope.

Where are you looking this Advent? What does your heart need to see this Advent?

During Advent, God invites us to slow down and watch for Christ. Watch with hope-filled expectancy and see Christ's grace in your life. Watch with wide eyed wonderment. This hope of Christ draws us closer to God and gives us courage to live as disciples in the mystery that Christ lives today and will come again.

This Advent, New Era offers opportunities for you to have intentional time reading, hearing, seeing, and talking about where Christ is in your life and what this season of Advent might mean for you. Each Sunday morning as we gather for worship, we will light the candles on the Advent wreath as we anticipate God's extraordinary promise to live among us in the flesh.

Perhaps God beckons you to watch and wonder as you walk outside, pray, read your Bible, or share in conversation with friends and family. Wherever you look for Advent this year, I pray you see glimpses of God's surprising grace. I pray you are fed and nourished by the life-giving power of the Holy Spirit. And I pray you experience the hope of God whose light shines in our darkness.

"The season of Advent means there is something on the horizon the likes of which we have never seen before ... What is possible is to not see it, to miss it, to turn just as it brushes past you. Devotions for adults



- 1. Devotions will be available through Augsburg Fortress. This year's devotions are called *Heaven & Nature Sing*. *Heaven and Nature Sing* includes daily devotions based on our scripture readings we hear in worship. In addition to devotions, the book offers household blessings and prayers to enrich your preparations and celebrations. These devotions extend through Christmas into Epiphany. *Large print devotion books are available*
- 2. Advent calendar for your fridge: This calendar offers one word to focus on each day of Advent, such as anticipate, look, breathe, hope. It is a simple and hopefully effective way to slow down and focus our hearts and minds on the promise of Emmanuel. Children can also take part in these!

Devotions for families & children

1. Make your own Advent wreath: We will provide green clay, a tea light candle, birthday candles, and weekly prayers for little hands to help make an Advent wreath and participate in lighting a birthday candle each week. This could be done alongside your family's Advent wreath.

 Families Celebrate Advent & Christmas is a colorful deck of cards that is full of rituals, prayers and reflections. Endlessly flexible for busy schedules, you can create a new after-meal ritual, use them as decorations, or carry them on the go. Explore the entire season from Advent to Christmas through Epiphany.



Advent Event: Sunday, December 5th after worship & congregational meeting After the congregational meeting (see notice in the newsletter), we will gather for a potluck lunch in the fellowship hall. We will have a craft for all ages to enjoy. Anyone who would like, is invited for a Hanging of The Greens worship service after the craft.

Tuesday night "Soup Suppers with Jesus" You are invited to join us for a soup supper on Tuesday nights during Advent. We will gather to eat at 6:00 and then enjoy prayer, Bible Study, & conversation following the dinner. The Bible Study and conversation will focus on the Advent themes of hope, love, joy, and peace.

Good Gifts

The ELCA offers congregations a fun and effective way to make a difference as we seek to diminish world hunger and poverty. Good gifts offer alternative Christmas gifts that "grow the church, fight hunger and transform lives" (elca.org/goodgifts). They offer 50 items for individuals or congregations to purchase such as animals, school supplies, Bibles, or food. Children and confirmation students will be offered a piggy bank to collect and bring back lose change from home. Each week, we will also offer an opportunity to collect lose change in addition to

our regular offering. All money collected will go toward purchasing an item or multiple items that the Sunday school and confirmation students will choose. We will also decorate a tree with Good Gifts ornaments. Each ornament has an item that could be purchased. Take the ornament home and purchase the item as a way of carrying God's love and generosity to our neighbors across the world.

A season of waiting

Our oven recently bit the dust, and the needed replacement part is no longer manufactured. Due to an appliance shortage, we had to wait eight weeks for a new oven! Yet even amid inconvenience, I see God's purpose. We were thankful to have a grill and slow cookers in the meantime. We creatively attempted to cook favorite meals in different ways. And though we craved anything baked in an oven — cookies, casseroles, even chicken nuggets — we realized that waiting eight weeks for an oven isn't truly a trying time.

Many of us wait for much greater milestones and miracles: physical healing, the return of a prodigal child, an end to financial struggles. Paul offers us hope as we wait: "May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Christ Jesus had" (Romans 15:5, NIV). When you're in a season of waiting — including Advent! — consider what you're thankful for and what you crave. Tell God how you're feeling and ask for endurance while you wait.—Janna Firestone



Joy amid suffering

Only Matthew records

the holy family's "flight into Egypt," linking Advent with Lent and Christmas with Good Friday. In an article titled "Joy to the World/Pain in the World," James I. Cook expresses gratitude that Matthew documents the slaughter of the innocents: "I turn to it again and again, when someone I know loses a loved one at the height of the Christmas season. It helps me — and I hope it helps them — to remember that theirs are not the first tears to fall on Christmas; to recall that there has never been a Christmas of pure peace and happiness; [to recognize] that 'joy to the world' has always been sung to the accompaniment of much 'pain in the world.'"

A shoot brings life

Last year, Israeli scientists harvested dates from seeds that had been dormant about 2,000 years. The seeds, recovered during archaeological digs, were nurtured in incubators and several thrived. One (named Methuselah!) became a 10-foot-tall palm tree.

Horticulturists joked about marketing "dates that Jesus ate," but there's another scriptural connection. Isaiah 11, a traditional Advent reading, prophesies: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots" (verse 1, NRSV). Jesus is the tender shoot that emerged from the humble peasant origins of Jesse, father of King David. From a dynasty that went dormant due to Israel's sins sprouted a mighty tree, who will someday usher in a reign of peace (see verses 6-7).



The example of Mary

"We must look to Mary's example to know how to deal with the glorious impossibilities of God," writes Calvin Miller in *The Christ of Christmas*. "Look how she turned the world upside down by making one simple statement." Jesus surely could have come to earth without Mary's aid. But God seems to prefer partnering with people to accomplish miracles such as salvation and healing. So God chooses Mary to carry the Savior. Later, Jesus often declares people's own faith crucial to their healing. And today, God works justice through us, not apart from us.

God doesn't force us into collaboration. Yet, notes Miller, "God needs only a little of our agreement in order to work mighty wonders." Like Mary's humble assent: "I am the Lord's servant. ... May your word to me be fulfilled" (Luke 1:38, NIV). And like yours — for whatever partnership God invites you into. God will do the heavy lifting, for certain, but he hopes you'll say yes.

Savoring simplicity

Clare of Assisi, who lived in the 1200s, founded the Poor Clares, a community of simplicity and service. "O holy poverty," she wrote, "to those who possess and desire you, God promises the kingdom of heaven and offers ... blessed life!"


These ancient words still ring true. We can't serve both God and money, says Jesus, adding that it's a matter of the heart. But before selling your house, consider small steps for embracing simplicity and blessing: Trade an afternoon of shopping for coffee with a friend who's struggling. For guests, prepare a pot of chili rather than a multicourse meal. Donate goodquality items you're not using.

Living simply is challenging, especially at the holidays, but the rewards are simply amazing. "The challenge of simplicity is a magnet to the human spirit," writes Dale Evans Rogers. "Much of the beauty of Christmas lies in its challenge to look further, deeper, until we find its secret in the heart of God."

Recipe Corner Pumpkin Chocolate Chip Cake

- 1 pkg spice cake mix
- 1 can solid packed pumpkin
- 2 eggs
- 1/3 C water
- 1 C semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 C semi-sweet chocolate chips melted (optional)
 - 1. Heat oven to 350°F. Grease and flour 12-cup bundt pan.
 - 2. Combine cake mix, pumpkin, eggs, and water in large bowl. Beat 1 to 2 minutes until well blended. Stir in chocolate chips. Pour into prepared pan.
 - 3. Bake 35 to 40 minutes or until toothpick inserted near center comes out clean.

 Cool in pan 10 minutes; then invert on wire rack to cool completely. Drizzle melted chocolate over cooled cake.
