A Pastoral message on the overturning of Roe Vs. Wade July 2022

In light of the recent Supreme Court's decision to overturn Roe v. Wade, I feel it is important to offer a pastoral message as we consider how Christ calls us to live and lead in times such as these. Our faith influences our cultural perspective, and any current cultural events influence our faith. Our religious beliefs aren't separated from our political or societal views. Therefore, I want to help us consider how our faith influences our views on abortion and how we live by our faith now that safe and legal abortions are not accessible in many states. Above all else, I want to express my support for anyone needing to discuss this further, anyone who is hurting because of this Supreme Court decision, or anyone who needs help in accessing healthcare.

You may or may not know that the ELCA has several social statements on a wide array of topics in our society. The social statement entitled *Abortion* is grounded in the conviction that "Christians are united in Christ through faith with both the freedom and obligation to engage in serious moral deliberation." As ELCA social teaching it draws upon this community's faith tradition that understands God's life-giving purposes as pressing "beyond the usual 'pro-life' versus 'pro-choice' language."

(<u>https://www.elca.org/Faith/Faith-and-Society/Social-Statements/Abortion</u>). This recent Supreme Court ruling may not impact your life at this moment, but Christ calls us to engage the needs in our society as we seek to care for our neighbors who are hurting.

One of the aspects of the ELCA that I strongly appreciate is the space we allow for different views and perspectives. We celebrate the diversity within the Body of Christ. We seek unity in God's mission, but not uniformity. As the social statement notes,

"The topic of abortion [...] involves powerful feelings that are based on different life experiences and interpretations of Christian faith and life in the world. If we are to take our differences seriously, we must learn how to talk about them in ways that do justice to our diversity." (pg.2)

This social statement holds in tension the deep conviction to protect life as well as the complex situations that contribute toward the need for an abortion. As Christians, we believe all human beings are created in God's image and all human beings have intrinsic value, worth, and dignity in all phases of development. Out of the deepest value for all life, the social statement names the concern with how common induced abortions have become in our country but makes a claim that abortion should be legal. "Laws should be enacted and enforced justly for the preservation and enhancement of life and should avoid unduly encumbering or endangering the lives of women" (p. 9). Now that abortions are no longer guaranteed to be legal or safe, there are drastic consequences for teens and women who have an unexpected pregnancy.

Years ago, I worked as the Director of Pregnancy and Adoption at Catholic Charities in Oklahoma City. It was my role to offer the options of either parenting or placing the baby for adoption, and then guide the teen girl or woman through the process. Because the agency was Catholic, we were not allowed to discuss abortion as an option. Ironically, it was through my time working with these teens and women that I gained helpful insight into the reasons abortions are considered. learned that there are many health-related reasons and many socioeconomic reasons that lead to the decision to abort the fetus. I also learned that while the legal arguments continue, society is overlooking the physical and mental health of the women who face unhealthy pregnancies while living under systemic poverty.

Our country faces a new framework in which we are called to serve and lead by love. Christ calls us to learn more about this complex topic and how we can support and advocate for all who are impacted by this change: women who are facing an unexpected pregnancy and their loved ones; pregnancy centers and reproductive centers who care for women. If we are to value life in all stages, we need to advocate for improved education, improved healthcare and childcare, and equitable resources for low-income parents and children. This Supreme Court decision must not end the conversation but be an opportunity to grow in understanding and love.

Lastly, I would like to share some guidance from our Presiding Bishop, Bishop Elizabeth Eaton. In a recent letter to the ELCA, she offered her own pastoral message regarding this Supreme Court decision which can be accessed on the ELCA website. This is her closing paragraph: "Finally, I wish to remind everyone that this church supports peaceful means of expression within a diverse society. Peaceful protest is a crucial element of civic engagement; violent protest is not, and this church reproves it. Likewise, this church is on record against hate speech. Let us be instruments for peace where there is none. Let us listen to one another. Let us serve the needs of neighbors in all the complexities life presents. God calls us to be *for* others, just as God in Christ is for us." (https://www.elca.org/News-and-Events/8158)

Liberty through surrender

To non-believers, talk of



finding freedom **SUR RENDERED.**" through complete dependence on Jesus must sound foolish. How can surrendering your desires, time, heart — indeed, your entire life — lead to anything but bondage?

The answer is evident in Jesus' own life and ministry, writes Michael Card in *Immanuel: Reflections on the Life of Christ*. In a twist on Julius Caesar's motto "Veni, vidi, vici" ("I came, I saw, I conquered"), "Jesus lived by the motto, 'I came, I saw, I surrendered,'" Card notes. "By living out this unorthodox pronouncement, Jesus demonstrated that what the world regards as power is really impotence. True victory is only through surrender."

During the 16th century, St. Ignatius of Loyola wrote this prayer of surrender that's still relevant today: "Take, O Lord, and receive my entire liberty, my memory, my understanding and my whole will. All that I am and all that I possess, Thou hast given me: I surrender it all to Thee to be disposed of according to Thy will. Give me only Thy love and Thy grace; with these I will be rich enough and will desire nothing more. Amen."

Oxygen for ministry

Flight attendants instruct airplane passengers that if oxygen masks are needed, we should secure our own before assisting someone else. Why? If we aren't getting enough oxygen ourselves, we can't help another person for long.

The Holy Spirit empowers Christians for ministry — the work of loving and caring for our neighbors and God's creation. But if we aren't Spirit-fueled on an ongoing basis, we will soon lack capacity to serve. This may manifest as burnout, cynicism, exhaustion or even lack of faith. So how to ensure we're breathing in the Spirit's energy and guidance instead of poorquality "air"?

By taking part in corporate worship regularly, immersing ourselves in the Scriptures (devotional reading and Bible study), praying "continually" (1 Thessalonians 5:17, NIV) and spending time with Christian friends and mentors. Opening ourselves to the Spirit in these ways allows the Breath of God to flow into us, which in turn empowers us to reach out to others in love.—Heidi Hyland Mann

The soul as soil



Gardeners who've dealt with inhospitable conditions can relate especially well to Jesus' parable of the sower. Drought, invasive critters and

thorny weeds often seem to conspire against growers' efforts. Yet when seeds fall on "good

soil," the crop yield is abundant — up to a hundred times what was sown (Matthew 13:8).

That parable emphasizes the need for hearts to be receptive to God's Word. But it's also a reminder to plant Scripture persistently. Just as soil and weather conditions change, so may someone's attitude toward following Jesus. Pastor J. Ellsworth Kalas writes, "Whenever we serve as witnesses to the faith, we must do so with all earnestness, because one doesn't know the season in which the soul currently abides. That uninterested, distracted or unresponsive person may be nearer the Kingdom than we or they — realize." Kalas adds, "We dare not give up on anyone at any time — including ourselves."

This is not an either-or situation. Christians everywhere are citizens of two countries, one on earth and one in eternity. The kingdom of God is not yet fully come, but it's already in effect. Our two citizenships can neither be fully united nor fully separated. We cannot withdraw from the world and pretend we are somehow dwelling only in the kingdom of God now; nor can we simply embrace the world and assume earthly governments fulfill God's will. Those are extremes, and they are unbiblical.—from a sermon by Stan Purdum


All we need to know

When a loved one dies, we have questions: What caused the death? When will the funeral be? What form will our grief take? Some deaths also bring spiritual questions: Where was God? Is our loved one with God now?

Paul shared deep thoughts about death with the believers at Corinth. His complex ideas might raise further questions, but here's the key: We don't need to understand everything right away — not all of Paul's theology, or everything about God or all the practical matters around a loved one's death. Here, from 1 Corinthians 15 (NRSV), is what we do know: "Christ has been raised from the dead" (v. 20) - death doesn't have the final say. "All will be made alive in Christ" (v. 22) — a loving promise God offers to all. "The last enemy to be destroyed is death" (v. 26) — in the end, Jesus will destroy all sickness, pain, sorrow, war, poverty, oppression and even death itself. We are in God's loving hands. That's all we need to know.—Heidi Hyland Mann
