### To Live as One

Greetings, friends in Christ!

Recently, over at Shepherd of the Cross, we've noticed a theme: though there are some endeavors Shepherd is hosting for just Shepherd folk, there are so, so many joint endeavors goin' on.

- We've just wrapped up our Family Faith Night year working alongside Grace and Zion Lutheran to offer opportunities for children, youth, and adults on Wednesday evenings.
- We're inviting congregations to participate in a summer monthly event – Generations of Living Faith (GOLF), intended to build relationships between people and grow in faith…even across generations.
- We're an active participant in the formation and participation of Christian Day Camp and a Mini VBS for preschoolers.
- And based on an invitation from the Muscatine Chamber of Commerce, Shepherd is coordinating congregations who are interested in selling pie as RAGBRAI riders come through Muscatine (be on the lookout for more information!).

Point being: there's been a lot of collaboration goin' on recently...and even this list isn't exhaustive. Because just recently, our Shepherd folk were graciously invited to meet with some of your folk from New Era to pursue two joint worship services this summer on June 11 (at SOTC at 9:00 am) and July 16 (at New Era at 9:00 am).

But why do all this collaborative work? And, why worship together? Can't we just "do our own thing" in our own respective congregations?

It's a valid question. Because for decades, churches have historically worked independently and focused on their own flock. Which, there's merit to that. But in the past few years, several congregations have recognized the joy of living and serving alongside one another in a way that uplifts the spiritual gifts we all have to share in the body of Christ. And, we've recognized the joy of what can be done when we work together.

But the thing is, the reason we work together isn't only because it lessens the workload. And we don't do this work together only because it's the "good" thing to do, or only because it stewards the resources we have. Rather, we do this work together, because in doing so, we live our Christ's prayer for his disciples. And in doing so, we become a witness so that the world might come to believe in the truth of Jesus Christ.

How do we know this? Well, on the eve of Christ's death, we find Jesus praying for his disciples (John 17). Get that: in Jesus' last minutes before Jesus goes out to the Kidron valley where Judas would betray him and every other event of his passion would ensue, Jesus prays for his disciples. And, even beyond those original 12 guys, Jesus also prays for all those who would believe in him through the word of his disciples, and the disciples after them, and the disciples after them. Implying, that Jesus wasn't just praying for 12 people. He was praying for the whole body of Christ. To make it personal, Jesus was praying for you. And, Jesus was praying for the people who will come after you.

That Jesus prayed for us is quite the thing to consider. But when we consider what he was praying for...it ups the ant-y even more. Because when you boil down John 17, what Jesus's desire for his disciples – and us – was all about was for his disciples to live as one with God (as Jesus lived as one with his Father) and for his disciples to live as one with each other. Not only because it's the "nice" thing to do. But so that through their living

witness, the world would know the Father's love, and the world would come to believe in Jesus Christ.

Which that, dear friends, is the reason we live as one with each other. Because even when it takes more time to plan something, and even when it creates more headaches, and even when we might come at something from different perspectives creating friction, we trust Christ's prayer for his disciples. And, we trust that just as Christ prayed for his disciples to be one, so too are we called to be one with each other and one with Christ...all so that we, and all the world, might come to know the love of God.

So, in the coming days, I challenge you to two things: First, consider how you're doing at living as one with those around you. What's causing that to be challenging? And, how might you be called to extend a hand and live as one with someone/a group near you?

And two, consider joining us for worship on June 11 (at Shepherd) and July 16 (at New Era). As we gather together, some things will likely be a bit different than what we might expect. But as we worship, we will be creating a space to practice living as one – together – so that all the world might know the Father's love, and so that all the world would come to believe in Jesus Christ.

## **Divine dance**

Using the fancy word *perichoresis* (from Greek for "around" and "contain") may win you admiring — or strange! — looks. But since the 7th century, people have used it as a beautiful image of the Persons of the Holy Trinity containing and permeating one another. A more familiar word, *choreography*, has led to recent understandings of perichoresis as the divine and eternal dance of love.

Picture three dancers' synchronized yet independent movements. Weaving gracefully in and out, each seems to know what the others will do next. They may touch lightly but don't constrain or impede one another. Though distinct individuals, they move so fluidly together that they are, in a sense, one entity.

Even more profound: Jesus invites us into the dance! "If you love me," he says, "you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth. ... I will come to you. ... I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you" (John 14:15-20, ESV). As the actions of Jesus, the Father and the Spirit

interweave in Scripture and in the world, may our lives too be drawn into the loving dance.

# Come glorify God together

Be careful not to compartmentalize corporate worship as separate from the rest of life. Instead, consider how you'll carry the experience into the coming week. Come ready to receive; then let that overflow fuel you for the days ahead. Come prepared to participate, knowing that worshiping together is a rehearsal for heaven. But most importantly? # **Finding freedom**

Juneteenth, America's newest federal holiday, marks the official end of slavery in the nation. President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. Applying only to the states in the Confederacy, it declared "that all persons held as slaves are, and henceforward shall be free." But news of freedom didn't reach Galveston, Texas, until June 19, 1865, when 2,000 Union troops arrived to enforce the decree. The U.S. Constitution's 13th Amendment, which bans slavery, was ratified a few months later.

Just as freedom and justice came in fits and starts to the Israelites, so it comes to our own country and around the world, where the pursuit for justice continues.—adapted from *The Wired Word* 

## All God's children

On the basis of the eternal will of God, we have to think of *every human being*, even the oddest, most villainous or miserable, as one to whom Jesus Christ is Brother and God is Father; and we have to deal with him on this assumption. If the other person knows that already, then we have to strengthen him in the knowledge. If he does not know it yet or no longer knows it, our business is to transmit this knowledge to him.

On the basis of the knowledge of the humanity of God, no other attitude to any kind of fellow man is possible. It is identical with the practical acknowledgment of his human rights and his human dignity. "Sadder still is when entire churches are disrupted by petty squabbles, partisan politics and overzealous opinions," he writes. "Relationships have been ruptured, marriages dissolved and families torn apart due to a harsh response to hurts instead of a spirit of forgiveness and an attitude of reconciliation."

Christians may sometimes feel tempted to seek payback, but Jesus calls us to live differently. "We need to be reminded that we are to be a transformed people, not conformed to the attitudes and actions of this world (Romans 12:1-2)," says Weliever. "To be light in a world of darkness. And to be the pure, preserving salt in a society that's become corrupted and impure (Matthew 5:13-16)."


- I wondered why the baseball kept getting bigger and bigger. Then it hit me.
