## August 2023, LSI Bulletin Back to School Month

Saying goodbye to summer and transitioning into a new school year can be a difficult time for many adolescents, especially those with emotional or behavioral disorders.

LSI has 27 therapists that provide mental health counseling to individuals of all ages through in-person therapy in over 20 locations across the state and virtual therapy in all 99 counties. In 2022, our Clinical Services team served more than 1,000 clients, totaling 14,000+ therapy sessions for lowans of all ages.

In addition, our Behavioral Health Intervention Services team wraps care around a child's entire family to empower them with skills like anger management, healthy decision-making and problem-solving. In 2022, the BHIS team served over 250 clients, resulting in more than 3,900 therapy sessions for children and their families.

Through LSI's Trauma Informed Care program at the Juvenile Detention Center in Waterloo, our staff work with the teens by completing trauma assessments on each adolescent and providing a summary to their juvenile court officers. The LSI staff also facilitate both individual and group therapy sessions with the teens to help them deal with their trauma and work through it in a productive way. 

"Love me when I least deserve it," says a Swedish proverb, "because that's when I really need it." ## A hunger for the heights

In a sermon titled "Sky Hunger," Stan Purdum explores Ephesians 1:3, where Paul writes about God blessing us "in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places" (ESV). The expression "sky hunger," says the pastor, "suggests that to be the best earthbound people we can be, we need to lift our eyes to a higher place — the *highest* place."

While on a mission trip in Kentucky, Purdum discovered that many residents refer to pastors as sky pilots. "What better role can a pastor

have," he asks, "than to point people to the skies, to the God Most High?"

The Easter anthem "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today," which celebrates our ultimate destination, sums up another definition of sky hunger:

Soar we now where Christ has led, alleluia! Following our exalted Head, alleluia! Made like him, like him we rise, alleluia! Ours the cross, the grave, *the skies*, alleluia!

"That to which our holy restlessness, our inner discontent, our sky hunger points us is Christ," Purdum concludes. "Sky hunger is a blessing from God, Paul tells us, to bring us into Christ, to fullness of life and to life eternal."

## Remembering St. Bartholomew

On August 24, the church commemorates St. Bartholomew, who is listed among the disciples. Because he is never named in the book of John — while a follower named Nathanael is mentioned only there — many scholars believe Bartholomew and Nathanael were the same man. Further, Bartholomew's name is next to Philip's in Matthew, Luke and Mark, while in John, Philip introduces Nathanael to Jesus, who says, "Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!" (John 1:47, NRSV).

Besides the Bible, Eusebius, the father of church history, is first to mention Bartholomew. Eusebius reports that Bartholomew gave a Hebrew translation of Matthew's gospel to Christian converts in India. Bartholomew also preached in Mesopotamia, Persia, Egypt and Armenia, where he was killed about 71 A.D. Tradition holds that Bartholomew was either beheaded or flayed alive and then crucified upside-down.

### God is watching

In the cafeteria line one day, a seminary dean noticed a bowl of big, juicy oranges. A sign by it read, "Take only one. God is watching you!" At the other end of the lunch line sat a large plate of freshly baked chocolate chip cookies. Beside it was a hastily scrawled note, likely from a hungry student: "Take as many cookies as you want. God is back there watching the oranges."

The message behind that good-natured irreverence? If you believe that God's sight is limited to one place, then your idea of God is too small!—adapted from *The Wired Word* 




### **Christian symbol**

**HARP** — This multi-stringed musical instrument is associated with David, who played to soothe King Saul and later wrote many Psalms. The harp also represents

praise music in general, as well as all the instruments people use to glorify God (see Psalm 71:22). The idea that angels play harps comes from Revelation 14:2 ("And I heard a voice from heaven like the sound of ... harpists playing on their harps").





Use simple ingredients and your imagination to bake these fluffy, cloud-like treats.

### What you need:

- · 3 egg whites
- ½ tsp. vanilla extract
- Mixer
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- · Parchment paper

### What you do:

- Preheat oven to 300°. In a mixing bowl, combine egg whites and vanilla. Mix at medium speed until frothy.
- While whisking, gradually add sugar and cornstarch. Keep whisking at high speed until stiff peaks form.
- Spoon mixture onto a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Create fun shapes.
- 4. Bake 20 minutes. Cool and enjoy!
